The 2004 ISSRM is hosted by the Colorado State University Department of Natural Resource Recreation and Tourism (NRRT) and its affiliated Human Dimensions in Natural Resources Unit (HDNRU) and Center for Protected Area Management (CPAM). Located on the CSU main campus in Fort Collins, Colorado near the foothills of the Rocky Mountains, NRRT's location provides an ideal setting for the study and teaching of natural resource issues.

CSU's HDNRU was established in 1991 by NRRT faculty to draw attention to the importance of examining the human element of natural resource management. The purpose of the Unit is to facilitate awareness and understanding of public values regarding natural resources, improve communication with the public regarding natural resource issues, to facilitate understanding and prediction of social impacts of natural resource decisions, and improve methods of applying human dimensions information in decision-making.

CSU's CPAM was formed to improve our ability to assist protected area professionals in strengthening the management of the world's protected areas and adjacent lands. Its objectives are to provide technical assistance and training to protected area managers and students nationally and internationally and to contribute to the shared knowledge base and network of protected area professionals throughout the world

Charles Jordan
The Conservation Fund
Keynote Speaker
Wednesday, June 2

Charles R. Jordan has devoted more than three decades to the relationship between conservation and quality of life. As Chairman

of The Conservation Fund, America's national land trust, he has helped the Fund and its partners to protect more than 3.6 million acres of wildlife habitat, his-



toric sites, green lands, wetlands, and open space. Mr. Jordan has also encouraged The Fund's board to challenge the environmental movement into broadening its agenda to be relevant to a wide-ranging and diverse spectrum of people and communities.

Having served as Director of Parks and Recreation in Austin, Texas from 1984-1989 and in Portland, Oregon from 1989-2003, Mr. Jordan is nationally recognized for his work and life long dedication to ensuring that all people understand that regardless of racial or economic backgrounds, safe outdoor playgrounds are something that every child deserves. Known for his eloquent and inspirational speeches, he has become a leading advocate for a national movement to create more "close to home" outdoor recreation opportunities.

Charles resides in Portland, Oregon with his wife of 35 years, Esther. They are the parents of two and grandparents of a grandson and granddaughter. Lynn Foden & Moses Njuguna Kanene African Wildlife Foundation Keynote Speakers Thursday, June 3

Lynn Foden began her international career as a Peace Corps Volunteer in the Democratic Republic of the

Congo. She also worked with the World Bank conducting studies on popular participation in large scale rural infrastructure projects in Africa. Ms. Foden worked for the Peace Corps as Associate Director in Mali, as **Country Director** in the Central African Republic and as Special Assistant to the Africa Regional Director. She then





spent several years working for private sector companies involved in various infrastructure development projects in Africa. She is currently the Director, Program Technical Design for AWF.

Moses Kanene is one of AWF's lead marketing and enterprise specialists. He has experience facilitating and managing tourism partnerships between landowners and private investors in Africa. He has a vision of much expanded sustainable economic development, bringing multiple investors and marginal communities as equity partners to achieve a triple bottom line of better livelihoods, increased profitability and sustainable conservation management. He came to African Wildlife Foundation in 1998 from business development and marketing experience in different organizations.

Perry Brown University of Montana Keynote Speaker Saturday, June 5

Dr. Brown is Dean and professor, College of Forestry and Conservation, and Director of the Montana Forest and Conservation

Experiment Station, at the University of Montana-Missoula. He has considerable expertise in natural resource social science, policy and planning, in recreation behavior and



planning, and in wilderness studies. A life-long westerner, he has served on the faculties of Utah State University, Colorado State University, and Oregon State University. He has served in formal advisory appointments with both the USDA Forest Service and the USDI Bureau of Land Management, including his current leave assignment with the International Programs Office of the USDA Forest Service. He is a Past-President of the National Association of Professional Forestry Schools and Colleges (NAPFSC) and currently is NAPESC's International Chair. He served as a member of the National Research Council's Committee on Forestry Research Capacity and Chair of the Pinchot Institute's National Panel on Wilderness Stewardship. He is a member of the executive/advisory boards of NAPFSC, the International Union for Forest Research Organizations, the Consortium for International Development (a consortium of 10 western universities), the Center for the Rocky Mountain West, the Western Rural Development Center, the Ecosystem Management Research Institute (a private non-profit research institute), the National Forest Foundation, the National Forest Service Historical Museum, and he chairs the Executive Committee of the **Rocky Mountains Cooperative** Ecosystem Studies Unit.

White River National Forest

The Dillon Ranger District is located in the White River National Forest and consists of approximately 312,000 acres within the White River National Forest boundary. It has



numerous opportunities for both summer and winter recreation and has been named the most used recreation Forest in the entire US Forest Service. During the summer there are over 200 miles of hiking trails, 150 miles of mountain bike trails, along with 100 miles of OHV routes. There is one group campground and 14 regular campgrounds in the District, providing 400 campsites for use from late spring to early fall.

In addition, consider renting a bike or pair of roller-blades and ride on the paved bike path that connects Keystone with the rest of Summit County. From the Frisco area you can travel to Breckenridge or all the way to Vail over Vail Pass. To get out and see Summit County up close, go to the Dillon Ranger District office, located in Silverthorne, and pick up one of over 40 hiking or 25 mountain biking trail guides.
